Artist Bio:

Artist Bio:

Allan Gorman's artworks have been exhibited in many fine art museums throughout the USA and Europe, including The Arnot Art Museum, Springfield Art Museum, Albany Museum of Fine Art, New Jersey State Museum, Lyman Allyn Art Museum, The MEAM Museum in Barcelona, and Einuadi Palace in Turin, Italy. Gorman's art has also appeared in commercial art galleries like Anthony Brunelli Fine Arts, CK Contemporary, and Liz Garvey | New York. The artist is a two-time recipient of an Individual Fellowship from The NJ State Council on the Arts and was invited as one of only eight artists chosen to represent the USA in Hyp'Art—an ambitious worldwide survey of hyperrealism as a worldwide phenomenon, with a major exhibition planned in Brussels in 2025.

Group exhibitions include the NJ State Museum, the Jersey City Museum, Barrett Art Center, City Without Walls, Women's Made Gallery and the AIR Gallery. dror/forshée is the working name of Hagit Dror and William Forshée. Together they form a creative studio with an extensive background in both fine art and commercial photography. Taking each project from pre-to-post production, they are known for their high quality production value and hands-on approach.

Selfie is a satirical reflection of social media. As we become more reliant on social media we disengage from the physical world. We feed our social status and self-esteem while algorithms filter our news. We become isolated in our own ideological bubbles. Selfie takes inspiration from Jacques-Louis David's Napoleon Crossing the Alps. Selfie was the start of a new series where the photography duo created and photographed narrative scenes spotlighting a variety of social and political issues, but as the series evolved it moved beyond. This is the only exhibition print that was ever made.

Nora Chavooshian is a sculptor who has exhibited extensively throughout the United States and is in private and public collections in both the U.S. and Europe. Her exhibitions include Max Hutchinson Gallery NYC, Denise Bibro Fine Art NYC, The Los Angeles Women's Building, Trenton City Museum NJ, Salem State College MA, Monmouth Museum NJ, and among other awards and commissions, she received a California Arts Council Grant to curate a show of San Francisco women's art work at the Los Angeles Women's Building. Among various public parks and buildings, Chavooshian's public art work includes a bronze sculpture for Essex County Brookdale Park playground, and an exterior sculpture commissioned for the University of Minnesota Arboretum's state of the art Bee Research and Discovery Center in which she collaborated with a beekeeper and bees to incorporate their honeycomb forms into her bronze sculpture. Widening her discipline and arena as a sculptor, she has designed award-winning sculptural stage sets, as well as film production design, designing several films for director John Sayles, sculptural set pieces for director Martin Scorsese, videos for Bruce Springsteen and Madonna, as well as many other film and videos.

Patti Jordan is a New Jersey-based artist conflating two and three-dimensional drawing and digital processes. She has exhibited her work throughout the US, England, France, and Korea. Jordan's most recent Solo Exhibitions are "Exposure 2021" at NYC's Ceres Gallery and "Subfusc" at Flat Tail Press Gallery (Minot, ND) in 2019. Aniza Jahangir interviewed Jordan for Alfa Art Gallery, art critic Sable-Smith for *No Tofu Magazine*, and WMBCTV for Curious Matter's exhibition, *The Ecstatic*. Her drawings are in the collections of the Walter Piehl Gallery, The Drawing Center's Viewing Program, and ArtHouse 6 Gallery. She received an Honorarium for a series of works in *Lineweight*, a contemporary drawing exhibition at Truman State University Gallery (Kirksville, MO), and is the recipient of a Ford Foundation Award. Jordan lectures on visual and media culture, and her writings appear in *ARTE FUSE*, *BOMB Magazine*, Bloomsbury Fashion Central, Intellect Books, and AS/Artist Studios, among others. She holds a Bachelor of Fine Arts with Honors from Pratt Institute and a Master of Fine Arts Summa Cum Laude from Montclair State University and is a member of the Women's Caucus for Art.

Artist Bio:

Shauna Finn is a figurative painter with a studio in Hoboken. Her recent paintings are of mysterious solitary figures, who are at times masked, enveloped in diaphanous veils, or dressed in the garb of bygone eras. They are otherworldly, or other-timely; their visages shifting between obscurement and illumination. Themes of feminine power, internal worlds, history, memory, beauty, death, and the supernatural all glimmer in Shauna's unconscious as she works. Shauna received her MFA from the New York Academy of art, and she teaches at Elisabeth Irwin High School in Manhattan.





Teena Soni is a New Jersey-based artist working within the traditional Indian-Miniature painting in a contemporary art setting. Her training belongs to the artistic region of Udaipur, Rajasthan where she apprenticed with both her grandfather, Badri Lal Chitrakar, the renowned Indian-Miniature painter and National Award/Shilp Guru Award recipient, and her father, artist Shri Sharad Soni. The rigorous training infused her natural abilities with the rich ancestral content of traditional artistry. Teena considers the historic art of Pichwai paintings as a base premise for taking heritage forward with added subtle contemporary component. Her mediums include cotton fabric or handmade paper, and prepared handmade colors from plant extracts with natural stones that are traditional Indian methods. These natural dyes give a vibrancy to the paintings through time and keep them alive for hundreds of years. Soni's work has been exhibited at Kanoria Art Gallery, Ahmedabad, India, Visual Art Center, Summit NJ, Pelham Art center, NY, Art Fair 14C, Jersey City and in New Delhi. Her work has been featured in *HYPERALLERGIC*, *Dainik Bhaskar*, and *Rajasthan Patrika*.

Jersey City native Tim Daly has lived and painted in Hoboken since it was cheap, long ago. Over the years, he was awarded four NJ State Council on the Arts Fellowship grants for painting and drawing. Among them in 2023 have been the NJ Arts Annual at Stockton College, *NJ and Me: Imperfect Together* at Drawing Rooms gallery, and the inaugural show of Arthouse Gallery in their new building in Jersey City.

Artist Bio:

Kirkland Bray is a painter and mixed-media artist best known for his paintings depicting overwhelming crowds within serene environments. The idea of overpopulation, perhaps in the planetary sense, or even a result of social media oversharing by prior visitors could be taken as serious societal commentary or as comedic mockery. Kirkland often uses unnatural dye patterns on discarded canvas as backdrops for these paintings and identifies Dada art as a direct influence, especially for its existence as a reaction to society at the time. When not in his art studio, you can find him in a different studio where he is the co-owner and designer of Billykirk, a leather goods manufacturer. Kirk and his brother have been creating leather accessories in the US since 1999. These two passions have lived in harmony ever since.
